

New sound: or

Lesson 72 of 83 (ages 3-6) / 66 of 77 (age 7+) · Vowel Teams & Tricky Words · Ages 3-7+ · about 10 min

GOAL

Your child can say /or/ when they see "or", and hear it in words like fork.

WHY IT MATTERS

"or" is 2 letters that make ONE sound. Seeing them as one unit stops your child reading the letters separately, and unlocks words like fork, born, corn.

YOU'LL NEED

- The practice sheet for this lesson (worksheet.pdf) and a pencil or crayon.
- The lesson page on a phone or tablet, for the sounds and games.

LESSON FLOW about 10 minutes

1 min

Warm up

Quick flash of the last sounds: write "ar", "oo", "oa" on paper, point, and your child says each sound.

SAY | *"What sound is this? And this one?"*

2 min

Listen

Play /or/ on the lesson page three times. Your child watches your mouth and copies.

SAY | *"This is /or/. Watch my mouth: round mouth, add 'r'."*

2 min

Show how

Show the letters "or" and the action: Pretend to row a boat saying or-or-or. Then tap the words on the lesson page.

SAY | *"When I see or, I say /or/. fork: /or/ fork!"*
"Two letters, one sound. They're best friends: they always stick together."

2 min

Do it together

Sound hunt: find 3 things at home with /or/. Then do the trace-and-write part of the practice sheet. Read together: fork, born, corn, torn, sort, for.

2 min

Play

Play the games on the lesson page: hear /or/ and tap its letters.

1 min

Wrap up

Ask your child to teach the sound and action to someone else in the family.

SAY | *"Can you show Grandma our new sound?"*

HEAR IT, FIND IT

Say the sound (not the letter name). Your child points to the letters. Tick first-try answers.

#	SAY / SHOW	CHOICES	ANSWER	
1	Say /or/	or, ar, oo	or	☐
2	Say /ar/	ar, or, oo	ar	☐
3	Say /oo/	oo, u, or	oo	☐

WATCH FOR common mix-ups and what to do

Says the sound too quickly to hear.	-> /or/ can be stretched: hold it like a long note, orororor, then let go.
Reads the letters one by one (o-r).	-> Put one finger under both letters at once: "these two make one sound".
Forgets the sound the next day.	-> Normal! Repeat the action and the keyword daily for a week: the action is the memory hook.

TOO HARD? MAKE IT EASIER

Only do the listening parts today: hear it, say it, find it in pictures. Save the writing for tomorrow.

TOO EASY? MAKE IT HARDER

Read these words and then write two of them from memory: fork, born, corn, torn, sort, for.
