

New sound: v

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Lesson 41 of 83 (ages 3-6) / 35 of 77 (age 7+) · Letter Sounds · Ages 3-7+ · about 10 min

GOAL

Your child can say /v/ when they see "v", and hear it in words like van.

WHY IT MATTERS

Every letter sound is a building block. Once your child knows /v/, they can use it in every word it appears in: van, vet, vim.

YOU'LL NEED

- The practice sheet for this lesson (worksheet.pdf) and a pencil or crayon.
- The lesson page on a phone or tablet, for the sounds and games.

LESSON FLOW about 10 minutes

1 min

Warm up

Quick flash of the last sounds: write "j", "l", "f" on paper, point, and your child says each sound.

SAY | "What sound is this? And this one?"

2 min

Listen

Play /v/ on the lesson page three times. Your child watches your mouth and copies.

SAY | "This is /v/. Watch my mouth: top teeth on bottom lip, voice it."

2 min

Show how

Show the letter "v" and the action: Drive a van and say vvvvvv. Then tap the words on the lesson page.

SAY | "When I see v, I say /v/. van: /v/ van!"

2 min

Do it together

Sound hunt: find 3 things at home with /v/. Then do the trace-and-write part of the practice sheet. Read together: van, vet, vim, vat.

2 min

Play

Play the games on the lesson page: hear /v/ and tap its letters, then find where the sound is in a word.

1 min

Wrap up

Ask your child to teach the sound and action to someone else in the family.

SAY | "Can you show Grandma our new sound?"

HEAR IT, FIND IT

Say the sound (not the letter name). Your child points to the letters. Tick first-try answers.

#	SAY / SHOW	CHOICES	ANSWER	
1	Say /v/	v, f, j	v	☐
2	Say /j/	j, v, l	j	☐
3	Say /l/	l, v, j	l	☐

WATCH FOR common mix-ups and what to do

Says the sound too quickly to hear. -> /v/ can be stretched: hold it like a long note, vvvv, then let go.

Mixes up /v/ and /f/. -> Same teeth-on-lip position — /v/ just adds a buzz from your voice box.

TOO HARD? MAKE IT EASIER

Only do the listening parts today: hear it, say it, find it in pictures. Save the writing for tomorrow.

TOO EASY? MAKE IT HARDER

Read these words and then write two of them from memory: van, vet, vim, vat.
