How to use this worksheet

- 1 Some words are split into two red chunks (like sh - ip) — the first chunk is the digraph, a team of two letters that make one sound. Say each chunk, then blend them together.
- 2 Remember: the digraph is a team, not two separate sounds — don't sound out its letters individually.
- 3 Write the complete blended word on the blank line.
- 4 Check your spelling against the printed word once you're done.

Example — this is what a correct answer looks like:

ch - ip -> chip

Tip

Kids who've mastered single letters often try to sound out both letters of a digraph separately ("c-h-i-p"). Remind them: the two letters are a team that makes one sound.
